Передмова

Посібник "English for you", частина друга "Practice grammar exercises and tests", ϵ збірником граматичних вправ і тестів, розрахований на широку аудиторію і призначений для закріплення граматичного матеріалу, представленого у першій частині підручника "English for you. Grammar from A to Z". Загалом він спрямований на підготовку курсантів військових навчальних закладів, слухачів курсів мовної підготовки і всіх військовослужбовців Збройних Сил України, посади яких передбачають знання іноземної мови, що дозволяє їм виконувати запропоновані завдання за посадами. Даний посібник рекомендується також для всіх тих, хто хоче вдосконалити знання з граматики англійської мови як самостійно, так і під керівництвом викладача. Це навчальне видання може стати корисним для викладачів при проведенні аудиторної та позааудиторної роботи.

Посібник охоплює основні граматичні явища сучасної англійської мови, знання яких необхідне для формування навичок письма, говоріння і розуміння текстів англійською мовою. При розробці завдань були використані матеріали із сучасної періодики та з інших автентичних джерел.

Навчальне видання структурно складається з декількох розділів. Для зручності користування граматичний матеріал у розділі "Grammar exercises" поданий у тому ж порядку, що й у першій частині підручника "English for you. Grammar from A to Z". Підбірка речень у розділі "Miscellaneous" виконана так, що завдання до них охоплюють всю граматику в довільній формі. Засвоєння граматичного матеріалу пропонується перевірити тестами, які розбиті на дві групи за різними рівнями складності. У розділі "Enjoy your English" можна перевірити свої знання шляхом виконання завдань у розважальній формі.

Завершується посібник підбіркою додаткового матеріалу, який може знадобитися при виконанні завдань, а також ϵ ключі до кожної вправи, що дозволя ϵ перевірити правильність відповідей і звернути увагу на ті моменти з граматики, які потребують ретельнішого вивчення.
